

When I read Never Closer I was floored, it was one of those reads that made time stop. The play ached in the way that you ache after a crush. It made me feel how I feel when I miss someone. I wanted the same from the production.

The setting is the 70s and 80s in Northern Ireland. You meet these friends inside the glorious, glowing possibility of what it is to be eighteen years old and then again, at the Saturn's return nightmare of twenty eight. Those thresholds are the other site of this work. Those rare moments in life when you're hovering at the edge of an impossible decision, the reverberations of which could be felt for generations. Scared to take the next step but fated to, not knowing that it is more dangerous to hesitate at the fork. Do I stay or do I go?

Ultimately though it's a story about love and friendship, about time and timing, about missed opportunities and miscommunication, and how whiskey makes a lot of stuff possible. I love it because it manages to capture the extremities, contradictions, and messiness of what it is to be human.

Early on in rehearsal we made a rule, that when the characters say 'I love you' they really mean it, so I take this seriously. To the cast and creatives - I'm mad about you. It's been the greatest joy to make this show with you. To Grace - thank you, thank you, thank you.
