First, let's answer some questions you might have

Is this show sensory-friendly?

Yes! The production of *The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time* aims to be **sensory friendly**, with this guide providing a detailed timeline of all the noises, volume levels and sights you will see in the production.

There is also a theatrical device within the show that will warn you when loud sounds or bright lights are coming. The actors will explain this to you at the start of the show.

Is there a particular day I should come?

No matter which session you come to, you will always be looked after by our friendly staff whilst you're at Belvoir St Theatre.

Belvoir St Theatre will also be running a 'Relaxed Performance' of *Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time* on September 14th for anyone who wants to experience the theatre in a more relaxed environment. This run of the show will feature much quieter sounds and the lighting overall will be less intense.

What do I do if I need to leave?

If you feel uncomfortable and feel like you need to leave, you can! Our friendly team will be in the theatre with you to help you into and out of your seats.

You'll be shown to the Green Room which is a low sensory area. Loud noises will be discouraged. You can view the stage on a screen from that room without any noise if you would just like to watch instead, without having to experience the lights and sounds.

What does our theatre look like inside?




Belvoir St Theatre is one of Sydney's biggest theatre companies, based in Surry Hills.

The stage is set in the corner of a huge room with the seats wrapping around the stage. This might look a little different to other stages you've seen.

You will have to walk down some stairs to access your seat.

In this room are 345 seats, and there is space at the back of the room to stand if you prefer to stand! Just let one of our friendly staff know.




ABOUT THE SHOW

What is it about?

Christopher, fifteen years old, is an extraordinary thinker. He's exceptional at maths and observes things nobody else sees. Everyday life is a little trickier – he has never ventured alone beyond the end of the street, he detests being touched, and he's wary of strangers.

Now he's in the front yard, it's seven minutes to midnight, and Mrs Shears' dog is lying dead at his feet, a garden fork in the neck. He's going to be the chief suspect, isn't he? So, who can solve the mystery? Nobody but Christopher, and what he uncovers takes him on a journey that even he couldn't have predicted.

We have provided a Timed Synopsis (Timetable) that tells you what happens in the story and when.



What are the main themes?

Family

Honesty

Bravery

Logic

How long will this run for?

The production will run for 2 hours and 45 minutes. Act 1 will run for 68 minutes, then there will be a 20-minute interval, and then Act 2 will run for 60 minutes.

At the end of the performance, once the cast has come out to bow and the audience is applauding, there will be an extra bit of performance, called the *Maths Appendix*. It's a dance about maths!

THINGS TO NOTE

- There are 8 cast members who all play different characters, and some cast members play <u>multiple</u> characters
- This play is set in Swindon in the United Kingdom, so you will hear different accents throughout the play

ADVICE ABOUT THE THEMES AND PRODUCTION ELEMENTS

Production Advice

This production contains:

- Music and some loud shouting from the cast
- Loud applause from the audience at the end of the show, which will vary with each audience
- High-level coarse and ableist language
- Violent behavior including depictions of violence
- References to domestic violence, self injury, meltdowns, sensory overload
- *(forewarned)* Loud noises and moments of visual intensity to reflect parts of the autistic experience.

Technical Advice

This production contains: haze, dynamic sound and lights, and the use of electronic cigarettes.

Sensory Support

Limited numbers of sound guards will be available from box office to borrow on request, throughout the season.

Foam ear plugs and quiet fidgets are also available at the box office - you don't need to return these.



GENERAL CONSIDERATIONS

- The runtime of this show is approximately 2 hours 45 minutes with one 20-minute intermission
- It is recommended that you stay in your seat during the acts, and stretch your legs in the intermission of the show
- If you do need to leave your seat, you can rise out of your seat and look for one of our friendly ushers who will use their torch to help you see your way through the seats and up and out of the theatre

SENSORY GUIDE IMPACT KEY

- On the 2 next pages you will find our Sensory Guide this will take you through the timeline of events in the show, and what auditory, visual and emotional impacts the show might have. See below a key which will help you navigate the guide.
- Auditory Impact has been measured by a decibel reader and anything over 70 decibels is listed below. Anything over 85 decibels is specifically referenced.

Throughout the play the death of a dog is frequently referenced. No dead dog is seen, and the death occurs before the play commences.
